

Washington (AFPS) — In pursuing a national goal of a manned lunar landing by 1970 the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) is using its Project Mercury to produce a

VP-5 Plays "Angel" to the Stricken

NAVAL STATION ROTA SPAIN— The "Mad Foxes" of Patrol Spuadron Five performed their fourth Search and Rescue mission of the current Mediterraneam deployment as crew six streaked to the scene of a downed Air Force F-104 Starfighter.

While performing their primary duty of anti-submarine patrol, the pilots and crews of Patrol Spuadron Five have assisted two other stricken aircraft and were presente to lend assistance to two tankers that had collided in the Straits of Gibraltar.

This mission was a good example of the high state of flexibilityand readiness that is maintained by the "Mad Foxes". Patrol Spadron Five's motto might well be, "Have planes-can do!"

This space craft, capable of coupling to another vehicle in an earth orbit, is being developed to work out space rendezvous techniques.

Another plan in carrying out the later Project Apollo manned lunar landing expedition is a direct flight. It uses a multi-million pound thrust Nova booster.

The two-man craft will look like the single-seat Project Mercury spacecraft. However, the slightly larger craft will be two or three times as heavy as the one-ton Mercury vehicle.

An Agena stage will serve as the target vehicle. It is similar to vehicles used in Discoverer and Ranger projects.

In practice, the Agena stage will be launched into an earth orbit by an Atlas booster. With information culled from telemetry, optimum launch time will be found and the Titan booster sent on its way.

When the rendezvous craft is orbiting small rockets on both vehicles will be used to maneuver them into coupling position.

Admiral Mc Donald will entertain Spanish and American officials at dinner on board this evening.

NAVY LAUNCHES 2 d MISSLE FRIGATE

The new 7,000-ton destroyer, Harry E. Yarnell, is a 533-footlong vessel with a 53,50 foot beam. The first of her class, the Leahy, was launched last July.

When completed the Yarnell will carry two dual Terrier, missile launcers, one forward and one aft. She will also carry antisubmarine rocket weapons (ASROC), conventional .50 caliber machine guns plus torpedo tubes.

The Yarnell will be equipped with a helicopter landing platform, and modern search and detection equipment for use against both air and underwarter targets.

The ship is the first vessel to be named in honor of the late Adm. Harry E. Yarnell, a graduate of the Naval Academy in 1897. His naval career included action in the Spanish-American War at Santiago, the Philippines insurrection, the Boxer Rebellion in China and

Our Founders Knew

History Shows Us Roots of Freedom Are Deep in Time

"Our Constitution does not copy the laws of neighboring states. We are a pattern to others rather than imitators. Its administration favors the many instead of the few and this is why it is called democracy...'

Whose words are these? Were they written by George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, John Adams or some other of the men of vision and lofty purpose who founded our nation?

No, but the framers of our Constitution—some of them excellent classical scholars—undoubtedly were familiar with them. They are the words of the great Greek statesman Pericles who led the government of Athens for 30 years.

"If we look to the laws," said Pericles, "they afford equal justice to all. If we look to social standing, advancement in public life and class considerations are not allowed to interfere with merit, nor does poverty bar the way.'

Words 2,500 years old—but they must have been bright in the minds of the delegates to the Constitutional Convention who gathered in Philadelphia in 1787 to frame the great document that would make a nation of 13 disunited states.



Civil War Had Army's First Female Officer

It's exactly 100 years ago that the U. S. Army, building its strength for the years of war that lay ahead, took a revolutionary step. It commissioned Dr. Mary Walker as its first female officer. At 29, Dr. Walker thus became the first woman in the world to be a military surgeon.

The Confederate Army also had its single distaff officer. She was Capt. Sally L. Tompkins of Richmond, $V\alpha$., who headed that city's principal hospital for sick and wounded soldiers.

Dr. Walker, who had graduated from the Syracuse, N. Y., Medical College in 1855, found her unique military status presented problems, but she took to the battlefield as well as supervising hospital facilities. A grateful Congress later voted her a medal for bravery.

She resumed her private medical practice in Washington in 1865, but the postwar activity of this colorful pioneer in Army medicine seems to have been crusading for women's rights.

During the war, in the field, she had adapted the uniform of the Union soldier to her own needs. She resumed feminine attire when peace came; then, as a zealous suffragette, she went back to masculine garb.

Here again she scored a "first." Dr. Walker was the first American woman to secure legal permission for such dress, in line with her battle to win more freedom for her sex.

Virginia U. Taking Over Management Of Project 'Squid'

Washington (AFPS) — The Navy is -transferring the management of Project Squid, their major long range research program in aircraft, missile and space propulsion, from Princeton University to the University of Virginia, effective Oct. 1, 1962.

The program, which has been in continuous existence since 1956 under the sponsorship of the Office of Naval Research (ONR), is concerned with exploring new ideas and turning up new knowledge rather than developing hardware.

Project Squid was initiated by ONR in 1946 when several universities agreed to join in a cooperative research effort to increase basic knowledge of the phenomena of jet propulsion.

Princeton University was assigned to serve as overall coordinator and then in 1951 was designated program manager and prime contractor.

Dr. John B. Fenn of Princeton has been director of the project since 1952. He will be succeeded next October by Dr. John E. Scott Jr., professor of aeronautical engineering at the University of Virginia.

Underwater Speed Of Sound 'Guide' Perfected by Navy

White Oak, Md., (AFPS) — The first comprehensive high precision measurements of speed of sound in sea water has been made by the Naval Ordnance Laboratory here.

The measurements are compiled into a standard reference guide useful for the study of underwater acoustics, thermodynamics and oceanography.

The tables take into account the effects of salinity, temperature and pressure on sound velocity at all depths of over 99.8 per cent of the world's oceans.

Recommended by the Navy's Hydrographic Office as containing the most comprehensive and accurate figures to date, NOL's sound velocity tables for sea water are already in use at some Navy installations.

Navy Reserve Squadron (Vr-772) From California Donates Drugs To Spanish

Rota, Spain.—U. S. Navy Reserve Squadron (VR-772) of Los Alamitos, California, last week shipped over 1000 lbs. of vitamins and antibiotics to Naval Station Rota, Spain for donation to the Spanish province of Cadiz.

U. S. Navy sailors from Naval Station Rota Hospital effected delivery to the city of Cadiz, Spain where the drugs were later to be distributed to needy charitable institutions throughout the province.

One fourth of the shipment was earmarked for Rota and Puerto de Santa Maria, two towns in close proximity to the Rota Naval Base where the majority of Spanish employees at the Naval Station live.

A presentation ceremony took place in the Cadiz City Hall attended by local Spanish officials and U. S. Navy representatives from Naval Station Rota. At this ceremony the Mayor of Cadiz expressed deep appreciation on behalf of the people of his city for this most generous and important donation. He further expressed hope that this type of generosity would greater cement the friendly relations and understanding between Spain and the United States which now exist.


